The past year was one of great challenges and opportunities for Broward County. United Way of Broward County responded to these issues aggressively. We invested more than \$18 million in our communities through coordinated work in our six impact areas: Youth Success, Financial Stability, Improving People's Health, MISSION UNITED, Emergency Needs and Substance Abuse Prevention.

United Way of Broward County's true strength comes from focusing on the needs of our community as a whole. Instead of working on one challenge, we concentrate on many of them to support our neighbors across the county. This way, your donation helps the high profile need everyone is aware of, but also supports the issues less obvious, but no less important.

During the 2014-2015 fiscal year, United Way continued to extend its reach in Broward County through its partnerships, initiatives and programs. Since its inception in 2012, ReadingPals volunteers have nearly tripled their volunteer hours ensuring more children are reading at grade level. Project Lifeline has provided more than 450,000 food insecure families and individuals with nutritious food, including fresh produce.

Since its inception, MISSION UNITED has served more than 2,000 veterans and their families with the services they need to re-acclimate to civilian life. In addition, five United Ways across this nation have adopted the MISSION UNITED program and are serving veterans in their area. There are over 30 more local United Ways currently looking at the program for their area which was created right here in Broward County.

We are very proud to play a leadership role in Broward County and are grateful to our supporters and community partners for their continuing endorsement and participation in our work. On behalf of United Way of Broward County, we present this recap of a challenging and incredible year of making Broward County a better place to live, work and play.

YOUTH SUCCESS

Helping children and youth achieve their greatest potential through early learning and leadership programs

Youth and families served by

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

- One hundred percent of children improved in all child developmental milestones
- More than 88 percent of children improved in their social and emotional functioning

YOUTH SUCCESS

- Children's academic skills and performance improved by 90 percent
- Literacy skills in children and youth increased 90 percent

YOUTH ACCOMPLISHMENT

- More than 90 percent of children and youth improved in life skills and daily functioning

READINGPALS

ReadingPals is an early literacy initiative for children kindergarten through third grade. The program focuses on ensuring these children have been exposed to the wonders of literature and are reading at grade level by the end of third grade.

United Way of Broward County engages, trains and deploys volunteer "reading pals" in our community. These volunteers dedicate an hour a week for 25 weeks to read in individual or small group settings. ReadingPals also provides the children with books so they can start a home library.




Achievements:

- Children with a "reading pal" increased their scores significantly in print knowledge, phonological awareness, math and oral language.
- ReadingPals volunteers contributed more than 5,000 hours impacting more than 320 students.
- The number of schools with a ReadingPals program grew from three in 2012 to 19 in 2014.
- More than 12,500 books were distributed to ReadingPals children.

FINANCIAL STABILITY

Empowering people to earn, keep and grow assets

Clients and families served through 23 programs

Achievements of the clients and families assisted by United Way of Broward County Financial Stability funded programs and initiatives

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

- More than 90 percent of program participants obtained a diploma, GED, or certification
- Nearly 100 percent of clients increased their employability skills
- Of the individuals assisted, 98 percent increased their level of financial literacy

EMPLOYMENT AND EARNINGS

- Employment was obtained and retained for at least six months by 85 percent of participants
- Of the people assisted, 69 percent were able to increase earnings, savings or credit scores

IMPROVING PEOPLE'S HEALTH

ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE

- More than 50 percent of clients were able to access healthcare and/or make medical linkages

OBESITY PREVENTION

- A healthy Body Mass Index (BMI) was maintained and/or unhealthy BMI was decreased by more than 60 percent

HIV/AIDS PREVENTION

- More than 57 percent of clients increased their knowledge regarding risky sexual behaviors
- Nearly 90 percent of persons tested for HIV returned for their test results



SUCCESS STORY SPOTLIGHT

LEONID



Leonid worked as a computer programmer until two years ago when he suffered a stroke at the age of 51.



He arrived at a clinic and entered the HEALTH program funded by United Way.




He battled diabetes for 15 years and had been out of insulin for weeks. He didn't have health insurance and made frequent visits to the emergency room where they provided him with small amounts of insulin.

MEDS

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Leonid brought in a list of eleven medications he was supposed to take, but couldn't afford. The nurse practitioner counseled him on specific lifestyle changes.



The clinic, with its cadre of specialists and services, attended to his medical needs. They stabilized his condition and provided medication to prevent him from relapsing.



Leonid is applying for jobs and is now able to focus on contributing back to society!

MISSION UNITED

Assisting Broward's Veterans as they re-acclimate to civilian life

Nearly 1,000 veterans and their families have been served through MISSION UNITED

MISSION UNITED is a critical program supporting US military service members, veterans and their families in Broward County by helping them re-acclimate to civilian life. Key focus areas include employment services, legal assistance, education, financial services, health and housing support.



Through MISSION UNITED, United Way of Broward County aligns existing services and creates solutions where there are gaps in support.


ACHIEVEMENTS:

- MISSION UNITED has assisted nearly 1,000 clients with one on one case management
- Free legal services were provided to more than 500 clients via Pro Bono Attorneys with services equaling more than \$600,000
- Nearly 70 mentors have been trained and more than 15 successful mentor/mentee pairs have been connected
- More than 140 veterans received mental health services and nearly 3,000 people received information at mental health events
- MISSION UNITED assisted more than 450 veterans and their spouses with career resources
- Veterans receiving employment services from MISSION UNITED went on more than 440 job interviews, resulting in 160 offers of employment
- More than 775 households were housed, or maintained housing through a SSVF Homeless prevention grant received by United Way of Broward County





SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION

Helping children, youth and families to live healthy and drug-free

Clients and families served through **16 programs**

United Way of Broward County's Commission on Substance Abuse is the county's broad based substance abuse prevention coalition dedicated to reducing substance use/abuse and all its devastating consequences on individuals, families and communities for more than 25 years.



ACHIEVEMENTS:

- More than 123,000 adults and over 510,000 children received services from United Way's Commission on Substance Abuse and/or funded partners
- An integrated marketing campaign educated the community regarding the risk factors associated with substance abuse and mental illness and reached more than 26 million people
- Nearly 70 professionals in the substance prevention field received technical assistance to enhance their skills and implement better programs
- More than 26,000 children and youth actively participated in activities to increase protective factors and educate the danger of drug use

EMERGENCY NEEDS

Providing emergency food, clothing and shelter

PROJECT LIFELINE

Project Lifeline is United Way of Broward County's response to the increased demands placed upon agencies and organizations throughout the community due to the economic hardships now facing so many of Broward County's families. Commencing in May 2009, this initiative coordinates the bulk purchases and delivery of nutritious food, including fresh fruits and vegetables, meats, rice, beans, and grains to a network of approximately 25 food banks and feeding programs in Broward County.



- More than 453,000 clients and families received over one million pounds of nutritious food
- Over 25 food banks engaged in bulk purchasing resulting in cost savings and increased volume of food




