# PROJECT lifeline



It's estimated that 220,000 people in Broward County face food instability every day. To serve the needs of our community year-round, United Way of Broward County operates Project Lifeline, an innovative bulk purchasing and distribution program, delivering fresh and nutritional food to more than 35 local food banks and feeding programs. Since inception, Project Lifeline has distributed 14.5 million pounds of nutritious food.

## Keeping Families Together A HOME FOR EMMA

Can you imagine being at risk of losing your child because you could not afford the rent prices each month, even while working full-time? That is what many families in Broward are facing right now, families like Emma.

Emma was at risk of losing her baby girl after she was scammed out of her initial deposit for a home. While Emma works to provide for her daughter, she had little to no savings to find another place to live and had nowhere to turn.

While living at a shelter, in fear her daughter would be taken away, she was connected with United Way's new pilot program, *Keeping Families Together* – which provides intense support to families involved in the child welfare system due to insecure or lack of housing. Shortly after being connected, Emma was loading her belongings into a van and moving into her very own apartment with her daughter.

The outcome could have been incredibly different for Emma if United Way did not have the support from donors like you.


