## When discussing Suicide...

Let's Say	Instead of
✓ Died by suicide	Committed suicide, suicided, died of suicide
Ended or Took his/her/their own life	X Chose to kill him/her/them self
✓ Suicide or Suicide death	X Successful or completed suicide
Non-fatal suicide attempt or Survived an attempt to die by suicide	X Failed or unsuccessful suicide attempt
<ul> <li>Disclosed or Shared suicidal thoughts or intent</li> </ul>	✗ Threatened suicide
Person living with suicidal thoughts or behavior	X Suicidal, suicidal ideator or attempter
Working with or Supporting  a friend/family member/loved one/ client/patient with thoughts of suicide	Dealing with a suicidal friend/family member/loved one/client/patient
✓ Lethal means safety	★ Lethal means restriction
"Increasing" or "Rising" trends	✗ "Skyrocketing" or "Epidemic" trends
Populations with potentially higher rates of suicide	"High" or "At-risk" people/populations

Use straightforward terms to describe trends, (e.g., "increasing" or "rising")  Discuss the death with limited details, use language that is sensitive to a grieving family, and provide suicide prevention resources in communications.  Communicate that coping skills, support, and treatment work for most people who	Use dehumanizing or blaming language (e.g., manipulative or attention-seeking behavior, suicidal gesture)  Use strong terms with shock value, (e.g., "skyrocketing" or "epidemic")  Quote directly from a suicide note or provide detailed descriptions of the location or method of death, memorials or funerals, or the level of grief of family  Present suicide as a common or
